Scotland continues to have one of the most unequal patterns of land ownership in the global north.

1,252 owners hold 67% of privately owned rural land (Land Commission Report 2020.)

Absentee land ownership across Scotland:

- Scale and Concentration, monopoly land ownership
- Fragmented land information, ownerless land

Land Reform Is:

Measures that modify or change the arrangements governing the possession and use of land in Scotland in the public interest.

• Key developments:

2003 - Land Reform Act

2015 - Community Empowerment Act 2016 - Land Reform Act

2017 - Scottish Land Commission

2023?- Land Reform Act

Community Land Ownership in Scotland

- Geographic community
- Open membership, led by a Board
- Non-profit distributing
- Community support
- Business plan
- Community Right to Buy





- 2.9% of Land in Scotland is in Community Ownership (191,261 hectares of land)
- There were 612 assets in community ownership as of December 2020
- These assets were owned by 422 community groups
- 72% of residents in the Western Isles live on community-owned land




- 1. Community owners take a holistic approach to climate action


This is about how we understand land and people
